Kenneth Casebeer, Professor of Law at the University of Miami, graduated from Georgetown University and Harvard Law School. He teaches courses in constitutional law,

jurisprudence, work law and collective bargaining. His scholarship on constitutional law and social theory, employment, labor history, medical ethics, and legal philosophy combines traditions of American Pragmatism and the Frankfurt School of critical theory. Professor Casebeer has published and edited the labor law newsletter, *Re-Working*, served as a peer reviewer for academic journals in social theory, and sat as a board member for numerous private and public institutions.
